Basic Card/Tablet Weaving	\$10 if student does not bring their own thread/string or cards	This is a beginners course in Card/Tablet weaving. Students will learn to "speed warp" their looms, and how to turn, rotate and flip the cards to get hundreds of different designs. Advanced students can use this same warping to learn how to create patterns and write words with string.	2 balls of same dark color, 2 balls of same light color of #3 or #10 Crochet Cotton (Michaels Crafts), 13 tablet weaving cards (Lacis cards from Amazon), weaving shuttle, tablet weaving loom. Beginning Spool Knitting!!	\$7	<p>Remember them from your childhood? Spool knitters (French knitters, knitting Nancys, corks, etc.) are a fun and very portable method of making a round cord or flat fabric. They are actually just a small version of the knitting looms that are so popular today.</p> <p>The cord made on the spool knitter is basically an i-cord. It can be used as drawcord, decoration, to make a "braided" rug.</p> <p>The flat fabric can be used for decoration, edging, and more.</p> <p>We'll use a spool knitter to make both the round cord and flat fabric, and cover how to start and end the project.</p>		Debbie Coyle
Cordmaking on the Lucet	\$5 per person	Learn a fun and simple cordmaking technique using the lucet (a two pronged "fork" ). Lucet made cord is an alternative to icord and crochet chains. The cord can be made from any yarn and can be used for trim, drawstrings, shoelaces, and other cord uses. No experience anything is required.		Debbie Coyle
Create a Spinning Matrix	0	Ever wanted to spin a more specific yarn but not sure which element to tweak? Practice learning to sample for something AND create some excellent samples and examples for your own spinning repertoire. We'll look at "amount of twist" in singles and separately the "amount of twist" in two-ply. The goal is to create a matrix of samples (low, medium, high twist in the singles // low, medium high plying twist) and eventually a set of sample "finished objects" from them (knitted, woven, etc.) Bring your favorite spinning tool (wheel, spindle, spinner) and a notebook. If you have a specific fiber you prefer, bring some of that, too.	Spinning tools, favorite fiber	Cat Ellen

Dye a self-striping yarn	\$10	<p>Students will go home with a full 100g skein of sock yarn. We are going to use fiber-reactive dyes and commercial cotton or cotton blend yarn to make self-striping yarn. We'll wind skeins into long loops and dye two or three colors. When knitted these colors will make repeating stripes.</p> <p>We will be using gloves! If you have any kind of skin sensitivity and can't use basic kitchen gloves please bring something you can use.</p> <p>The dyes are the type used for tie-dye and do not require heat, however they need time to bond with the fiber so you will be taking your yarn home wet and rinsing it out the next day. I'll have plastic bags and rubber bands to keep it as neat as possible.</p>	Rubber/nitrile/vinyl gloves, apron	Anne Schwarz
Ice Dyeing (first and last hour)	\$10	<p>Beginning and Intermediate techniques for ice dyeing with Procion dye.</p> <p>No experience needed. Hands-on class to learn the basics of ice dyeing with fiber reactive dye on cellulose fiber, such as cotton, linen, bamboo, and hemp.</p> <p><b>**Please note that ice dyeing takes place in stages, so it's not just one continuous class session.**</b> You'll need to drop your materials off before breakfast for pre-soaking. During class time, you can do resists if you wish, and still have time for putting the dye and ice on. They'll sit all day in the dye. Plan to come back briefly after lunch to add ice if needed, and at the end of the day for wrapping, steaming, and rinsing.</p>	1-2 washed cotton t shirts in a light color (or equivalent - several kids shirts, many baby items, etc)	Theresa / Ercil

Peyote Stitch Heart Beaded Ring	\$5 per person	<p>Learn how to work even-count peyote stitch, and follow a peyote stitch chart by making this cute heart ring.</p> <p>This is a beginning level beading class--no previous work with beads necessary.</p> <p>You will have to thread a needle and work with very small beads, so bring a magnifier, an extra light source or reading glasses if you need them.</p>	<p>Scissors (small sharp embroidery style work best).</p> <p>Any assistive equipment necessary for working with small beads and threading a needle with a teeny weeny eye: magnifiers, extra light source, reading glasses</p>	Melise Gerber
Silk Fan Painting	\$5	Paint a colorful design on a 9inch round silk fan using paints and metallic paint pens. Bring printed paper of your heraldry or other design, or choose from one of our graphic designs to decorate your painted silk fan. (\$5 materials fee per person/fan)	Paper copy of their design, heraldry or graphic image on 9inch round. Wear apron, or clothes they don't mind accidentally dripping paint onto.
